The Foundation

At the initiative of a group of concerned parents, the Fondation Autisme Luxembourg (FAL) was established in 1996 to promote and defend the rights of people with autism in Luxembourg, whatever the severity of their disability.

Severity, symptoms and signs of autism may show a wide range of combinations and considerably vary from one person to another. Although there is no cure, much progress can be made and appropriate and early support allows people with autism to better cope with their disability.

A multidisciplinary team specialising in autism identifies and can support the different needs of people with autism and their families.

Diagnostic assessment

- Define whether the assessed person has autism
- Make an assessment of the person's skills
- Propose concrete and individualised educational strategies
- Perform a medical assessment



Support and training

- Understanding this disability: training, counselling, parent-professional meetings...
- Support, educate, and help a person, taking into account his/her disability
- Set up a medical monitoring
- Allow appropriate care
- Propose an after-school care
- Obtain support from care insurance

Location

Interventions of this service are primarily provided in the premises of the FAL in Capellen.



68, route d'Arlon L-8310 Capellen The Foundation is currently hosting 20 people in three homes in Munshausen. Two rooms are available for short stays. To cope with the increasing demand, a second lodging will soon accommodate a maximum of 24 people in Rambrouch.



Role

- Ensure a life of dignity and quality for the residents

- Promote socialisation space by independent housing



- The work of the educational team is based on the TEACCH programme (www.teacch.com)
- Accompany residents in performing daily tasks and leisure activities
